There was this popular song that came out in the 1980's by Janet Jackson. The song is called, "What have you done for me lately?" Now, pop was not my thing back in the day, but the song is catchy and repetitive, so it often got stuck in my head. Basically, the song is about exactly what the title says it is about. It's about me, asking you, what you have been doing to make my life better, even if you have to do it at your own expense. This always seemed to me to be a bit, oh I don't know, maybe arrogant...selfish.... aloof.....and even judgmental. Now, I'm sure that Janet Jackson (or whoever wrote the song) wasn't researching some sort of positive relationship dynamic theory when the song was written. More likely, the final result had attitude, a good beat and people could dance to it. Someone thought that this self-centered attitude might appeal to the masses so the song was recorded and lots of money was made! In the end, in the secular glitzy big money world of egos and the need to stay atop of ratings charts, this is just another pop song rooted in selfish human desires. So what in the world could it have to do with Christianity or Easter?

Well, maybe a lot. The song is really kind of ugly in the way that it portrays people as selfish and self-centered. It seems audacious to think that someone would think that the role of the other people in their life is to tend to selfish needs and wants. But the gospel is clear that this was and is the kind of problem that caused humanity to turn away from God and to our own desires. Given the choice, we chose ourselves over God. In Christian circles, we call this The Fall, and its result was a brokenness between God and people that would require divine intervention if it was ever to be repaired. In Christ, God intervened. He sent Jesus to save the world. God knew that the world would crucify him and that it would do so without apology. But God sent Jesus anyway. *So, here's where the song comes in. "So God, what have you done for us lately?"*

In His love for us, God sent a savior to redeem an unrepentant people to a relationship and a life that they had chosen long ago to leave behind. From the moment things went wrong in Eden, to the day Christ was crucified humanity's focus was humanity. But on the cross, Jesus forgave us for that choice and also took the punitive repercussions of our sin on himself. The repercussion was, by the way, death! Then....Jesus was raised from the dead and in this act overcame evil's big gun. If Satan could not kill God, then Satan could not stop God. God then chose to share that life with people. This meant that Satan could now no longer stop life in people either! The curse was broken! We were set free, or to quote God "O death, where is your sting?!"

And...let's keep going with this....The risen Jesus' teachings and works and promises were now clearly unstoppable as well. This means that love, grace, forgiveness, peace, hope, joy, healing, redemption, reconciliation, and 1000 other great things were now impossible for evil to overcome. He has stayed with us through the valley of shadows and guided us to the place when love's light drives out fear, principalities powers and any and everything that would try to stand in the way of our place in God's life!

He is risen! He is risen indeed! And because he has done this...for us...so we are...through him risen too!

Help Save Lives—Arm to Arm

It's time to roll up your sleeve and save a life.

On Saturday, April 7 from 7:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m., PPC will once again host a blood drive for the American Red Cross, and we would love your support.

Every two seconds, someone in the United States needs blood. Approximately 36,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U.S. Nearly 7,000 units of platelets and 10,000 units of plasma are needed daily in the U.S. Nearly 21 million blood components are transfused each year in the U.S. One pint of whole blood can save 3 lives through the separation of the red cells, platelets and plasma.

Ok, so those are the statistics. While staggering, let's be honest - it's dry reading. The truth of the matter is your blood donations help save lives, one pint at a time. When blood goes from arm to arm it literally gets to the heart of the matter.

Right now, blood donations are saving the life of one of our own. Tina Ross has recently been diagnosed with Aplastic Anemia, a rare condition in which the body stops producing enough new blood cells. Thanks to blood and platelet transfusions, Tina is here to fight another day.

At the tender age of 2 years old, Claire Ratliff (of Claire's Army), was the recipient of blood donations during her cancer treatments, as are countless other cancer patients. People diagnosed with cancer, especially when being treated with chemotherapy and/or radiation, suffer from innumerable blood related health issues, and the only way to address these issues is through transfusions. If you have ever donated blood it is highly likely that you have helped to save the life of a cancer patient.

I've had the opportunity to give blood several times. On a few occasions I've done it for a friend or family member. It makes you feel good to be able to give something like this to someone you care about. I don't like needles, but I've never found giving blood to be a difficult experience. And then came the day when the tables turned and I was having a fairly routine surgery. Things took a turn for the worse. I required four pints of whole blood during surgery and a plasma donation after surgery.

I know that our stories are not unique. People receive the gift of blood every day and I am sure that many of you can share a similar experience, which is why donating blood is so important. There is no artificial substitute for the benefits of blood.

It takes approximately 1 hour to donate from the time you walk in until you leave; the actual time for blood donation is between 15-20 minutes. Because we know that your time is valuable and many of you have children, we will have childcare available on the day of the blood drive to make donating more convenient.

Please prayerfully consider donating the gift of life-giving blood on Saturday April 7. You can visit redcrossblood.org and enter MintHill-Churches to schedule an appointment or call 1-800-RED-CROSS.

Download the Blood Donor App today. Get your digital donor card, schedule your next appointment, track your lifetime donations, view your blood pressure, and follow your donation on its way to the hospital.

Jesus said: "this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." Matthew 26:28

Think about the difference in the experience of donating blood and what Jesus went through. Unlike the Red Cross where you are treated with great respect and dignity, Jesus went through a shameful ordeal. They spat on him and cursed him and mocked him as he went through all his pain and suffering.

The cross was designed to be just as painful as it possibly could be. The greatest contrast of all is that Jesus didn't just give a little blood; a portion of his life. He poured out his life blood for us. He gave all! If Jesus could give it ALL, we should be able to give a portion for our brothers and sisters in need.

As someone who's life was saved by the selfless gift of a donor, I can say it saves lives. It saved mine! Give Blood. Arm to arm. Help change lives.

Let us all celebrate with Mrs. Frances Leete who now holds the Julia Black Cane as the oldest female member of Philadelphia Presbyterian Church! The cane was presented to Frances at her home on March 27.

The Julia Black Cane is engraved with the names of all its recipients and the years that they

held the cane.

The cane was made by Sandy Pernay Ross in 1976 from a wild cherry tree cutting from his backyard and presented to Mrs. Black by her son Dolph as a gift. It is designed with a mother of pearl accented handle and a carved silver band bearing the name Julia Campbell Black and the dates of her life, 1877-1979.

It was Mrs. Black's wish that the cane be held by the oldest female member of PPC like the John Bain Cane has been held by the oldest male member of the church since 1897.

Special thank you to Presbyterian Men

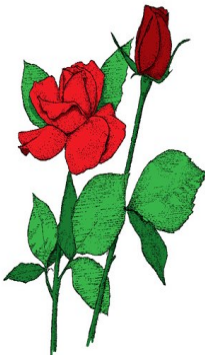

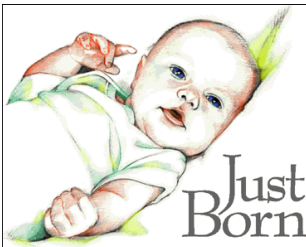

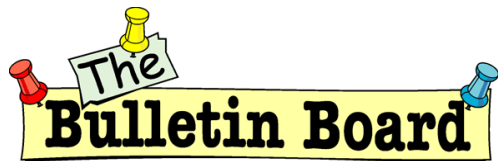
